Optimal Learning Environments to Ensure Student Success

School districts and administrators across Maine balance competing priorities daily—providing high-quality education while maintaining fiscal responsibility. A recent report from the Governor's Commission highlights the severity of the issue: Maine faces an \$11 billion need to replace or repair aging school infrastructure. ¹Most schools require significant upgrades, and with a 10-year backlog of requests at the Maine Department of Education, the gap between need and funding continues to grow. These conditions not only strain budgets but also directly affect the physical and academic well-being of students.

Fortunately, school districts have access to innovative funding mechanisms that can address these infrastructure needs without relying solely on traditional capital budgets. For example, Title 20-A of Maine state law enables schools to partner with Qualified Energy Services Companies. Through these partnerships, districts can finance improvements by leveraging guaranteed energy savings. Combined with utility incentives, grants, and operational efficiencies, schools can modernize facilities in a financially sustainable way.

One strategic focus within these projects is decarbonization—the process of reducing carbon emissions from school operations. Two major pathways are energy efficiency and electrification. By upgrading to technologies like heat pumps, schools can reduce reliance on fossil fuels, cut greenhouse gas emissions, and improve indoor climate control.

Heat pumps are particularly well-suited for Maine's climate and aging school buildings. They function year-round by extracting heat from the air or ground for warmth in the winter and

reversing that cycle to provide cooling in summer. Their adoption brings several benefits to schools:

- Lower energy consumption and utility costs
- Reduced greenhouse gas emissions
- Improved classroom comfort and quieter operation
- Access to rebates and incentives for displacing outdated heating systems
- Backup heating capability for resilience during extreme weather
- Alignment with Maine's statewide environmental and energy goals

For school business officials, investing in energy-efficient infrastructure is not just about cost savings—it's about creating optimal conditions for student learning. Better air quality, stable temperatures, and quieter classrooms contribute to better focus, attendance, and academic performance.

Now is a pivotal time to explore these solutions. By modernizing building systems with a focus on sustainability and student success, schools can meet today's demands and prepare for the future.

State Legislative Update

It would appear, for the most part, that legislative committees have wrapped up public hearings and work sessions on bills before them. The Appropriations Committee still has work to do and a handful of bills are still being printed but, the majority have been voted out of their respective committees.

For bills receiving unanimous support in committee or, divided reports (for example, majority votes of ought to pass vs minority of ought not to pass), those bills will go before the full legislature for vote.

Federal FY 2026 Budget proposal for K-12 education:

The budget assumes USED will continue to exist, but proposes to cut USED by \$12.4\$ billion (or -15%) to a total of \$66.7\$ billion.

It proposes consolidating all IDEA programs into one special education formula grant, flat-funded at FY25 levels. It recommends creating a new "Special Education Simplified Funding Program" designed to empower parents to direct these funds while keeping IDEA law in place.

It maintains Title I funding, except for migrant education programs. The budget proposes "preserving full funding for Title I" but also eliminating two Title I programs: -\$376 million for migrant education state grants and -\$54 million for special programs for migrant students (HEP/CAMP).

It would consolidate 18 other K-12 education programs into a new \$2 billion formula grant that would represent a -\$4.5 billion (-66\$%) cut. The budget doesn't specify which programs would be consolidated, what the new formula would be, or direct where to fund specific priorities. The proposal says the new simplified program "requires fewer Federal staff and empowers States and districts to make spending decisions based on their needs, consistent with the recent reduction in workforce and Executive Orders. The new approach allows States and districts to focus on the core subjects—math, reading, science, and history.

Charter school grants increase.

Funding eliminated proposal: This includes funding for migrant students, English Language Acquisition Grants (Title III), adult education, and several higher education student aid programs (including -\$70 million for Teacher Quality Partnerships).

USED's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) reduced by -\$49 million (-35%). OCR would continue ensuring that schools and other entities that receiving federal aid for education programs and activities comply with Federal civil rights law.

For other programs that may be of interest outside of USED:

- · Preschool Programs: Eliminates HHS' \$315 million Preschool Development Grants.
- · Medicare/Medicaid: Would cut Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Program Management by -\$674 million, but it would not have any impact on providing Medicaid and Medicaid benefits to beneficiaries.
- · USDA: No proposals impacting school meal programs were included in the skinny budget.
